POLICE CHIEF'S MESSAGE

Layton City Mayor and Council:

The following report details the Police Department's activities throughout the past year. The Department handled 50,297 service calls; resulting in 22,130 cases in 2015, a slight increase from the previous year.

Incidents on the rise in recent years involve persons suffering from mental illness. Officers respond to these types of calls on a daily basis; they are time and resource consuming. Last year the department responded to 665 such calls. With that in mind, Layton's Police Department continues to be one of the leaders in Crisis Intervention Training (CIT). CIT provides specialized skills to help officers deal with subjects in a mental health crisis. We require all of our officers to attend this training.

We are also proud of our efforts with the Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force (ICAC). We have one supervisor and one investigator assigned to ICAC and in December the Attorney General's Office awarded our investigator for being the most productive member of the Task Force in the State.

We continue to look for opportunities for community outreach, such as the radKIDS program, Smart911, Shop with a Cop, etc. This past year, the department became one of the first in the State to offer a Safe Exchange Zone which allows for custody exchanges or meetings for online purchases to take place in a safe environment near the Police Department and under 24 hour recorded surveillance. Also, in the spring we will be offering an assault defense program for women. This program teaches awareness as well as some self defense techniques to help ward off assailants.



PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS

The Police Department strives to ensure employees act in a manner consistent with Layton City’s mission, values, and objectives. Complaints from citizens and alleged policy violations are taken seriously. Investigations are done to determine the legitimacy of the complaint or violation and then categorized as one of the following:

Information Only – When the investigation is initiated, but no conclusion is reached due to employee resignation, allegation retracted by complainant, complainant’s refusal to cooperate, or other factors.

Not Sustained – When the investigation discloses that there is insufficient evidence to sustain the complaint or fully exonerate the employee.

Sustained – When the investigation discloses sufficient evidence to establish that the act occurred and that it constituted misconduct.

Exonerated – When the investigation discloses that the alleged act occurred, but that the act was justified, lawful and/or proper.

Unfounded – When the investigation discloses that the alleged act did not occur or did not involve department personnel. Complaints which are determined to be frivolous will fall within the classification of unfounded.

Use of force is also monitored closely to ensure all instances are reasonable and prudent.

Citizen Complaints

Citizen complaints are those that come from outside sources, including third party complaints. Any department member may take a complaint from a citizen. Complaints are thoroughly investigated and the Police Chief notifies the complainant in writing of the final disposition.

The majority of these investigations are the result of minor policy violations and the findings are used to identify deficiencies and develop specific training objectives to correct the issues. Occasionally the outcomes of these inspections result in formal discipline up to and including termination.

Use of Force

Police officers frequently deal with violent or disruptive individuals who pose a threat. Officers receive extensive training to help them determine when use of force is appropriate and at what level. The goal is to stop the threat without exceeding the level of force considered reasonable under the circumstances.

The following table shows how often different forms of force were used, not the number of suspects upon which force was used. Multiple uses of force can result when one level does not stop the threat and the next level becomes necessary. Vehicle pursuits, though not considered a use of force, are also listed in this table. Before entering into a pursuit, officers balance the safety of the public and themselves against their duty to apprehend violators of the law.

NEWS IN 2015

Progress

Safe Exchange Zone

An area in the City Center parking lot has been designated as a Safe Exchange Zone. This zone comprises of two marked parking stalls which are well lit, under 24 hour recorded surveillance, and are in a high visibility area near the Police Department.

This zone may be used for purposes such as child custody exchanges or other instances requiring a meeting with someone such as transactions involving online purchases.

Smart911

The Police Department continues to utilize the Smart911 program, which allows citizens to provide critical, lifesaving information in advance of calling 9-1-1. Department personnel held successful sign-up campaigns at safety fairs, the hospital, schools, and church groups across the City. Citizens can sign up for free at smart911.com.

Crime Free Multi-Housing Program

Two additional properties participate in the Crime Free Multi-Housing Program, bringing the total number of participating properties in Layton to 19. In comparison to 2014, 2015 resulted in 97 more calls for service and 27 more arrests from multi-housing properties.

radKIDS Program

The radKIDS Program was held again in the summer of 2015. 22 sessions of the program were taught, resulting in 401 youth completing the program. RadKIDS is a four day program offered for free and is taught by Layton City Police Detectives to children 7-12 years of age. RadKIDS teaches children safety and how to physically defend themselves against abduction. Layton City has offered this program the last five years and nearly 2,500 children have been trained. All classes are taught during the summer break at elementary schools in Layton. The schedule is available each spring and enrollment procedures are made available online at www.laytoncity.org.

NOTABLE EVENTS

Volunteers in Police Service

There are currently six volunteers who donate their time to help with department and officer training scenarios, community events, and other projects as assigned.

Shop with a Cop

The Department hosted a “Shop with a Cop” event in conjunction with Wal-Mart and Golden Corral. The program gives underprivileged children the chance to shop for Christmas presents and exposes them to police officers in a positive manner. In 2015, 21

Layton officers volunteered their time and helped 28 kids have a happier Christmas. Representatives from other agencies in Davis County also attended the event; 4 officers from Kaysville PD, 3 officers from Syracuse PD, 4 officers from Clearfield PD, and 5 Layton firefighters.

Child Identification Kits

Officers provide child identification kits at events. The kits provide parents with a single document that contains their child’s personal identifying information, photograph, and fingerprints. They are the most requested service from the Community Resource Unit.

Department Tours & Presentations

In 2015, 77 tours of the police station were conducted, most often to scouting groups. Additionally, 5 presentations were made to various groups. The topics presented involved personal safety, crime prevention, frauds/scams, and topics pertinent to fulfilling scouting merit badges.

Community Events

Members of the Police Department were involved in several community events throughout 2015. Some specific events to note are the Safe Kids Fair, Arts in the Park, Tip a Cop, the Kendall O. Bryant Fire Prevention Awareness Day, Shop with a Cop, and the Special Olympics Torch Run.

Emergency Response Training

In spring 2015, Layton Police personnel participated in an active shooter exercise at Davis Hospital. 12 officers participated in an exercise to allow hospital employees practice their emergency protocols.

In September 2015, Layton Police participated in an active shooter exercise at the Layton City building. All employees who work in the City building were put through active shooter training, which included two scenarios.

POST Region 2 Training


Layton Police Department continues serving as the coordinating agency for POST accredited training in Davis County. During 2015, the department hosted several training classes and continued a partnership with the Weber State University Law Enforcement Academy in an effort to bring more training to the area.

Crisis Intervention Training (CIT)

Layton PD hosted two CIT Regional Academy classes in 2015. CIT provides specialized training to help law enforcement deal with subjects in a mental health crisis. Forty officers representing numerous agencies were certified during these two CIT training sessions. Layton PD is the CIT Regional Coordinator for the Davis County area, and all Layton police officers receive the CIT training.

POLICE SERVICE CALLS


Police service calls include requests made by citizens for police service as well as officer generated activity, some administrative duties, and follow up on previous calls. There was a slight increase from 2014 to 2015. At this point it is unknown if the total number of service calls will continue rising or if the pattern of rising and falling from year to year will persist.

Part 1 Crimes

Layton Police participates in the FBI's UCR (Uniform Crime Reporting) program. UCR counts the number of incidents reported to each participating agency that involves a Part 1 Crime.

Only one Part 1 Crime can be reported per incident. If more than one Part 1 Crime occurs in a single incident, the most serious crime is reported. Discrepancies in crime numbers in this report are due to this rule.





TRAFFIC

Stops and Citations

The number of traffic stops and citations issued remains fairly steady with the exception of 2013, which had the highest total for each category among the years compared. The number of traffic stops and traffic citations were both lower in 2015 than any previous year compared. There were 11,872 traffic stops and 4,931 traffic citations in 2015.




Five year comparison of traffic stops and citations.

ACCIDENTS

Traffic accidents are categorized as either reportable or non-reportable. Accidents resulting in injury to or death of any person, or accidents with total property damage to the apparent extent of \$1,500 are reportable.

There were 1,007 reportable accidents and 778 non-reportable accidents reported in 2015. The overall number of reported accidents was higher than past years. There were fewer reportable accidents and more non-reportable accidents than past years, although the percentage of reportable accidents with injuries or possible injuries was slightly higher.




Five year comparison of traffic accidents.

Fatalities

There was one fatality accident in Layton in 2015.

Auto vs. Auto

An 89-year-old male driver died as the result of injuries sustained four days after a two vehicle accident which was caused by the driver turning in front of another vehicle. There was a passenger in this vehicle and the only occupant of the other vehicle was the driver.

INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

Cases

The Detective Division handled 1,188 cases in 2015: 672 cases involved major crimes, 178 involved minor crimes, and 338 were information or non-criminal.

An additional 1,435 cases were sent to investigations for review which were not assigned for further investigation.

Clearance Rate

A case is considered *cleared* if an arrest was made or charges were filed on the suspect or would have been if not for exceptional circumstances such as the victim refused to cooperate or the prosecutor determined there was not enough evidence to obtain a conviction. Basically, a cleared case is a solved case.

The clearance rate reflects the percent of cleared cases versus those that were closed with no further leads. Cases that are still being investigated are not used in calculating clearance rates.

ICAC INVESTIGATIONS

In 2015, Layton Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) agents have been responsible for assisting the Attorney General's ICAC Task Force in serving over 100 search warrants statewide. These warrants resulted in numerous items of evidence collected and several high profile arrests on predators that have victimized children online.

One case involved a juvenile male installing the Grindr application on his phone, which allowed multiple adult males to contact the juvenile with their intent to meet up with the juvenile. One adult male made contact and victimized the juvenile and fled the scene. A second adult male arrived to the meet

location and was arrested prior to meeting the juvenile. Through the investigation and forensic examination of mobile devices, the initial male was located and arrested on first-degree felony charges. Through this and other cases, ICAC investigators have examined 137 cell phone and mobile devices and 22 hard drives from computers.

Layton ICAC investigators give presentations to high schools and various groups throughout northern Davis County. There were 20 presentations given, reaching 1,152 people. These presentations help educate adults and youth about the hazards and risks involved with child predators on the Internet, as well as ways to help protect themselves and their children from these risks.

Vice Investigations

Two different massage parlors opened up in Layton City in 2015. An undercover operation ensued to identify potential suspects and patrons soliciting sex for money. In December 2015, an undercover officer was sent into one of the massage parlors and was solicited while obtaining a massage. The arrested female was identified as the business owner of the other massage parlor which opened around the same time. Layton Police are working in conjunction with the Layton City Business Licensing Division and the Layton City Attorney’s Office to revoke both business licenses. Five undercover prostitution stings were conducted, resulting in two arrests

Sex Offenders

There were 158 sex offenders registered in the City of Layton at the end of 2015.

Mentally Ill Subjects

Having contact with citizens in the community who are known to be mentally ill or who are suspected of being mentally ill is a component of police work. The Investigations Division has designated a detective to complete follow up contacts with mental health consumers who call for service. The follow up will serve to put them in contact with available

resources and establish a point of contact between them and the department. In 2015, the department identified 665 cases involving a suspected or known mentally ill subject.

CSI

The Crime Scene Investigations Unit is responsible for collecting, processing, and maintaining evidence from crime scenes and for storage and purging of found and safekeep property items.

During 2015, nearly 2,200 pounds of over-the-counter and prescription drugs were safely disposed of for community members through the Police Department’s drug disposal program.


